Nearly every state has experienced fires that rage out of control in the landscape. While the largest and most devastating burn in the West, fires can spread anywhere suburb meets country or housing development meets conservation land.

Homeowners can protect

their properties in two ways: · design and maintain a landscape that discourages fires • build with flame-resistant materials

"Fires need fuel, such as dead trees, shrubs and grasses," says Tchukki Andersen, BCMA, CTSP\* and staff arborist with the Tree Care

Industry Association (TCIA). "While no landscape is fireproof, there are steps you can take to reduce the danger."

TCIA offers these tips for your landscape to combat wildfires: • If you are in a wildfireprone area, reduce the

amount of potential fuel

enough tree- and shrub-free space between your home and the undeveloped land to help ensure that your home can survive without firefighters.

• All dead branches that hang over your roof should be removed. Leaves, needles and

around your home. Provide

other dead vegetation should not be allowed to build up on the roof or in gutters. • In parts of the country where wildfires are rare but still possible, an area of well-

of potential wildf

irrigated vegetation should extend at least 30 feet from your home on all sides. In high-hazard areas, a clearance of between 50 and 100 feet or more may be necessary - especially on downhill sides of the lot.

• Further from the house, install low-growing shrubs. When planting trees, space them no closer than 10 feet apart. Beyond 100 feet from (See Danger Pg. 3)

#### Clinic supporting the social, emotional needs of youth to be held on Tuesday, September 19

Traumatic events in children's lives impact their neurological functioning, influences their behavior and sometimes leads to mental health diagnosis. Children in families with high levels of stress are twice as likely as their peers to be disengaged in school and four times as likely to have behavioral or emotional problems.

The Indiana Youth Institute, Geminus Corp-oration and Boys and Girls Club of Northwest Indiana are hosting a free training event to give adults who work with youth a better understanding of the effect that stress and trauma can have on the children they serve.

the house, dead wood and older trees should be removed or thinned by qualified professionals.

• The lower limbs of tall shade trees should be pruned 6 feet above the ground. A professional arborist should always be contacted to remove any large broken or dead limbs high in the tree. Careful pruning preserves a tree's appearance, enhances structural integrity and assists in the plant's ability to resist fire.

The event will run from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. CDT on Tuesday, September 19 in the basement meeting room of Geminus Corporation, 8400 Louisiana Street in Merrillville.

Tracy Butler, IYI's director of college and career counseling, will speak to attendees about how stress and trauma can impact a young person's social-emotional health and development. Attendees will learn how to provide traumainformed support and environments to youth in schools and community programs.

Gas leaks can be harmful to an entire neighborhood if not properly addressed. • Identify multiple evacuation routes prior to an emergency, and share this information with neighbors.

"As a general rule, the healthier the tree, the more likely it is to survive a fire," explains Andersen. "In addition to pruning, a professional arborist can recommend fertilization, soil management, disease treatment or pest control measures to promote healthy trees. Landscape design and maintenance are also important factors in a home's survival."



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
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#### Winfield Community Foundations seeks residents to participate in 'On The Table' discussions

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This day in history

#### September 15, 1950

During the Korean War, U.S. Marines landed at Inchon on the west coast of Korea, 100 miles south of the 38th parallel and just 25 miles from Seoul. The location had been criticized as too risky, but U.N. Supreme Commander Douglas MacArthur insisted on carrying out the landing.

By the early evening, the Marines had

overcome moderate resistance and secured Inchon. The landing cut the North Korean forces in two, and the U.S.-led U.N. force pushed inland to recapture Seoul, the South Korean capital that had fallen to the communists in June. Allied forces then converged from the north and the south, devastating the North Korean army and taking 125,000 enemy troops prisoner.

The Korean War began on June 25, 1950. In the opening months, the U.S.-led U.N. forces rapidly advanced against the North Koreans, but Chinese communist troops entered the fray in October, throwing the Allies into a hasty retreat. In April 1951, Truman relieved MacArthur of his command after he publicly threatened to bomb China in defiance of Truman's stated war policy. Truman feared that an escalation of fighting with China would draw the Soviet Union into the Korean War.

Approximately 150,000 troops from South Korea, the United States, and participating U.N. nations were killed in the Korean War, and as many as one million South Korean civilians perished. *www.history.com*
