# **New statewide map** available for Hoosiers seeking food assistance during COVID-19 pandemic

A new, interactive online tool will make it easier for families to find food resources near home; site will be updated to reflect current openings and closures The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration, in partnership with the state's food banks, the Indy Hunger Network and Feeding Indiana's Hungry, has developed a statewide, interactive map that will help Hoosiers seeking food assistance find what they need. The map is online at www.in.gov/ fssa/dfr/5768.htm and will be prominently featured at www.fssa.in.gov. The map can be used on desktop/laptop computers and mobile devices.

"Many Hoosiers' situa-

tions have changed as a result of our state's important and necessary response to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic," said Jennifer Sullivan, M.D., M.P.H., FSSA Secretary. "We know there is a significant need for families - many of whom have never needed assistance before. We hope this tool helps them locate resources to meet their food and nutrition needs during this crisis and in the future.'

There are two types of organizations shown on the map: food pantries and meal sites. Food pantries are locations where Hoosiers can pick up groceries to prepare and use at their homes. Meal sites serve packed meals, (See Map Pg. 3)

# **INDOT announces Virtual Job Fair: More than 1,000** construction and related positions available

The Indiana Department of Transportation has announced a virtual job fair in which more than 1,000 construction and related positions will be available through the state agency. The virtual job fair is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. EDT on Thursday, April 16, and will last approximately one hour.

Presenters will include representatives from both INDOT and the State Personnel Department. The program will cover what INDOT does, benefits in working for INDOT, how to apply for INDOT jobs, and details about specific jobs available in four main areas: Summer Seasonal State workers, Highway Maintenance Techs, Equipment Mechanics, and Construction Engineers.

"We appreciate the oppor-

tunity to promote our significant number of job openings to a broad audience," said Joe McGuinness, INDOT Commissioner. "This virtual job fair will enable us to get the word out to many Hoosiers who may be temporarily unemployed or simply looking for new opportunities they might have otherwise not been aware of."

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development will host the virtual job fair. DWD and INDOT joined forces once before for a successful virtual job fair in 2018. More than 400 individuals registered for the virtual event, including job seekers from 14 states across the U.S.

"The concept of virtual job fairs has proven to be popular with job seekers," said DWD

Commissioner Fred Payne. "It allows individuals to engage with employers without the obstacles of transportation, child care or other constraints in attending an in-person job fair. #### erican pub iergency **Stay home, save lives** essage to A

As emergency physicians risk their lives each day as they battle the worldwide pandemic COVID-19, they have a request of the American people: stay home and save lives.

"Emergency physicians are working tirelessly to protect as many people as possible. You too can do your part: stay home and save lives," said William Jaquis, MD, FACEP, president of ACEP. "This is the only way to slow the virus and the best strategy to prevent our health system from becoming overwhelmed."

People of all ages can contract the novel coronavirus, COVID-19. Some may have mild symptoms and could be contagious before they know they are sick—inadvertently spreading the virus and putting others at risk. The "silent transmission" of COVID-19 is one factor contributing to the spread. Younger adults are not immune from risk. The

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) notes that nearly 40 percent of patients sick enough to be hospitalized were 20- to 54-years

"Even if you think you are healthy, spending time in groups or in public could spread the virus to people you are close with," said Dr. Jaquis. "Young people, older people and everyone in between needs to follow the recommended steps for social distancing."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends putting distance (about six feet) between yourself and others. Guidelines to shelter in place, or stay at home, vary based on location. Conditions where you live are likely changing rapidly. Make sure you are getting health information from reliable sources such as your doctor, public health department or local leaders.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), it took 67 days from the first reported COVID-19 cases to reach 100,000 cases, 11 days for the second 100,000, and just four days for the third 100,000.

"We have to do everything we can to stop the virus from spreading. For most people, that means hunkering down and doing your best to stay home as much as possible. We have a narrow window to take meaningful action, and that time is now."

A resource from American College Emergency Physicians, Stop the Spread: A Patient Guide to the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), provides tips on how to minimize the risk of contracting the virus and how to determine whether you should visit an emergency department.

# Before shutdow



DNR is striving to ensure the safety of the public and staff. As stocking trucks are on the road and stocking fish, please remember to practice social distancing.


Some egg collection efforts have been canceled for this year. Each year, DNR staff collect walleye and muskellunge (muskie) eggs from wild sources to sustain populations across the state. Though nearly all of Indiana's walleye waters are sustained through stocking, missing one year of stocking should not significantly



impact walleye fishing. Saugeye and muskie fishing also look positive. Muskies are a long-lived species, and their lifespans temper the effect of missed stockings.

## New, real-time COVID-19 diagnostic tests in development by IU and IU Health research collaboration

Indiana University researchers from the School of Informatics and Computing at IUPUI and the School of Medicine, in collaboration with Indiana University Health, are developing new diagnostic tests that combine speed and sensitivity for rapid detection of the viral

These tests can eventually be employed for faster diagnosis of health care workers and others who are on the front lines and exposed to COVID-19 patients.

Benchtop and palm-held sequencing-based approaches being developed by IU

principal investigator Sarath Janga and colleagues provide solutions for real-time detection of viral infections in clinical samples and further means to control the out-

"The issue with current accepted approaches for COVID-19 tests is that, while effective at detection, they are slow, with results taking up to a day or longer. We are testing our benchtop sequencing approach, which can potentially be done in two to three hours or even less," Janga said.

An additional advantage of this novel approach is that

testing may be performed at point-of-care in the clinic, rather than transferring samples to the lab, further reducing time and the risk of more infections.

Like coronavirus, several viral strains are pathogenic in nature, difficult to detect and easy to transmit, leading to

the emergence of pandemics. In the case of an outbreak, it is important to have a method to detect the virus as quickly and accurately as possible in order to prevent its transmission and efficiently treat infected patients.

# This day in history

# **April 3, 1860**

The first Pony Express mail, traveling by horse and rider relay teams, simultaneously left St. Joseph, Missouri, and Sacramento, California. Ten days later, the westbound rider and mail packet completed the approximately 1,800-mile journey and arrived in Sacramento, beating the eastbound packet's arrival in St. Joseph by two days and setting a new standard for speedy mail delivery.

Although ultimately short-lived and unprofitable, the Pony Express captivated America's imagination and helped win federal aid for a more economical overland postal system. It also contributed to the economy of the towns on its route and served the mail-service needs of the American West in the days before the telegraph or an efficient transcontinental railroad.

The Pony Express Company was set up along 150 relay stations on a pioneer trail across the presentday states of Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, and California. Riders, who were paid approximately \$25 per week and carried loads estimated at up to 20 pounds of mail, were changed every 75 to 100 miles, with horses switched out every 10 to 15 miles. The initial cost of delivery was \$5 for every half-ounce of mail.

The company's riders set their fastest time with Lincoln's inaugural address, which was delivered in just eight days. With the advent of the first transcontinental telegraph, the Pony Express ceased operations.
