Emergency physicians urge Americans to continue covering their face in public

As regions of the country are seeing rebounding rates of COVID-19, the American College of Emergency Physicians reminds everyone that practicing social distancing and continuing to cover your face when in public is the best recourse to slow the spread of the virus.

"As emergency physicians continue to battle the greatest public health crisis of our generation, you can do your part to stop the virus by covering your face when you need to be around others," said William Jaquis, MD, FACEP, president of ACEP. "Although COVID-19 continues to disrupt our way of life, we as a nation can band together in this simple step to protect ourselves and our neighbors."



While medical professionals continue to urge anyone with COVID-19 symptoms to self-isolate, even those that don't suspect they have the virus should cover their face because they could be asymptomatic and still be contagious. The infectious viral particles emitted when someone talks, breathes, coughs, or sneezes can remain in the air for up to three hours.

Reports have shown that covering your face with a mask or cloth during those infrequent times you need to be in public have effectively flattened the curve. According to a recent study from The Lancet spanning 16 countries, there is a 17 percent reduction in risk of infection for those wearing a mask or face covering versus those not covering their face.

The CDC and ACEP recommend that people who are not medical professionals wear cloth or homemade masks in public rather than tighter fitting medicalgrade masks, like the N95. Currently, CDC recommends that anyone above the age of two wear a face covering, (See Physicians Pg. 3) with exceptions for those

CPCF grant applications now available online for the September 1 grant cycle

The Crown Point Community Foundation is accepting grant applications online. Grants from the CPCF's endowment funds will be made to nonprofit organizations and community projects which serve the South LakeCounty area.

The three application cycles are February 1, June 1, and September 1. Applications received after the deadline will be held for consideration during the following cycle. Only one grant application per organization or agency will be eligible within a 12-month period.

award for for physics resear **Valpo University fundin**

University Valparaiso acquired a \$362,000 grant renewal from the U.S. Department of Energy for continuing nuclear and particle physics research over the next three years. The grant will cover funding for nine Valpo research students (three per year) and funds for faculty research.

"The continued involvement of our undergraduate students in nuclear physics research is consistent with the mission of Valparaiso University to foster in students a lifelong commitment to the search for truth, encouraging the development of a sense of personal vocation as well as the intellectual and professional skills needed to pursue it," said Shirvel Stanislaus, Ph.D., professor of physics and principal investigator for the grant. "This funding will provide multiple Valpo students with extraordinary research opportunities."

The renewal is from a DOE grant that originated in 2015, following the end of a previous grant, which, together, have provided 37 years of continuous funding for nuclear and particle physics research at Valparaiso University. During that time, 55 Valpo undergraduate students have been supported by the grant to participate in summer research.

Valpo students and faculty study the contributions to the spin of the proton by its constituents, using polarized proton-proton collisions alongside hundreds of physicists from institutions around the world. In this experiment,

carried out at the Brookhaven National Laboratory in Long Island, N.Y., scientific analysis methods are used to analyze and understand the asymmetry of pions produced from collisions of longitudinally polarized protons, i.e. protons with their spin vectors aligned parallel or antiparallel to the proton momentum vector. This research will help address the question, "What role does the gluon, as one of the constituent parts of the proton, play in forming the spin of the proton?"

Most students have opportunities to visit and work with scientists at National Laboratories like Brookhaven National Laboratory and Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico, in addition to research on campus at Valpo. Approximately 90% of students who have participated in this research have attended graduate school after graduating from Valparaiso University. Over the past 20 years, students have presented their work each fall at the Meeting of the Division

of Nuclear Physics of the American Physical Society, a conference attended by scientists from around the world.

Continuous funding for this research began in 1983 and was initiated by Donald Koetke, Ph.D., a senior research professor at Valparaiso University, who led the program for 22 years. Professor Stanislaus has led the program since 2009 and Adam Gibson-Even '00, Ph.D., professor of physics and astronomy, serves as co-principal investigator.

Applications for the 2020 Innovators Awards will be accepted through Friday, August 21 and are open to all innovators; regardless of discipline, industry or background.



who have trouble breathing or cannot remove a face covering without assistance.

Without a cure, personal choices and safe behaviors are the best defense against spreading COVID-19 and overwhelming our health care system. Although it may be inconvenient or uncomfortable, covering your face does not meaningfully deprive the body of oxygen. Workers in many professions wear masks that meet National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health standards all day without experiencing breathing issues. Many of the masks worn by people in fields like construction or manufacturing are heavier than the cloth coverings recommended for the public.

"Communities may be reopening but we are definitely not out of the woods yet. We cannot let down our guard. We can all do our part to safeguard our communities and prevent the spread of the virus," said Dr. Jaquis. "Cover your face, wash your hands frequently and practice social distancing. These three simple steps offer the best protection that we have until a vaccine is developed."



This day in history

July 10, 1943

The Allies began their invasion of Axis-controlled Europe with landings on the island of Sicily, off mainland Italy. Encountering little resistance from the demoralized Sicilian troops, the British 8th Army under Field Marshal Bernard Law Montgomery came ashore on the southeast of the island, while the U.S. 7th Army under General George S. Patton landed on Sicily's south coast. Within three days, 150,000 Allied troops were ashore.

Italian leader Benito Mussolini envisioned building Fascist Italy into a new Roman Empire, but a string of military defeats in World War II effectively made his regime a puppet of its stronger Axis partner, Germany.

In an elaborate plot to divert German forces away from Italy, a British submarine off Spain released the corpse of an Englishman wearing the uniform of a British major and carrying what appeared to be official Allied letters describing plans for an invasion of Greece. The body washed ashore, and the letters were sent by the Spanish to the German high command, who reinforced their units in Greece.

Montgomery and Patton advanced steadily toward Messina, prompting the Germans to begin a withdrawal of Axis forces to the mainland. The Allies suffered 23,000 casualties in their conquest of Sicily. German forces sustained 30,000 casualties, and the Italians 135,000.

Have fun, but make water safety a priority this summer

With summer in full swing, Indiana Conservation Officers remind Hoosiers to make safety a priority when recreating around bodies of water.

"Even when fun is your main focus, always recognize the danger water poses, even to strong swimmers or experienced boaters," said Capt. Jet Quillen of DNR Law Enforcement.

If you are going to be recreating around water, follow these basic safety tips:

- Discuss the dangers of water with your family and loved ones before going out.
- Wear a lifejacket.
- Tell someone where you are going and when you will

eturn.

- Go with a buddy. Do not venture around flooded or fast-moving wa-
- Avoid alcohol.

In addition to basic water safety, Indiana Conservation Officers also stress the importance of boating safety and remind boaters to know the rules of the water.

Reducing a boat's speed in unfamiliar areas and being aware of unusual water conditions respective to the size and type of boat are not only safety tips, but also important environmental considerations. Regardless of your boat type, doing an initial assessment of water levels and current speed are essential.

Designate a sober boat operator. Alcohol causes impaired balance, blurred vision, poor coordination, impaired judgement, and slower reaction time. These impairments can be magnified by wave action, sun exposure, and wind. It is illegal to operate a motorboat or personal watercraft in Indiana while intoxicated due to alcohol or drugs. Indiana law defines intoxication as having a blood alcohol level of 0.08% or greater.

A lifejacket should be United States Coast Guard approved, in good working condition, and size appropriate for the wearer. New lifejackets are designed to be lighter, less obtrusive, and more comfortable. Inflatable lifejackets allow mobility and flexibility for activities like boating, fishing, or paddling, and are much cooler in warmer weather.

"A person is never too old to wear a lifejacket," said Lt. Kenton Turner, Indiana's Boating Law Administrator. "The majority of Indiana drownings on public waterways involve adults."

The award was created to honor the late Richard C. Sussman Ph.D., former chairman for the Society of Innovators and head of Research and Development at ArcelorMittal. Known as a prolific team builder and innovator, Sussman is credited for pushing creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship as critical elements to remain competitive. This award builds on his legacy for a stronger Northwest Indiana.

A Lifetime Achievement Award winner may be selected upon recommendation of the Selection Committee and at the discretion of the Board of Directors. Not only must the Lifetime Achievement Award winner demonstrate significant innovation, but that the work was sustained over a significant amount of time and their success was not limited to just one role, company or sector. This award is the Society's highest honor for an individual leader whose work took place in or significantly impacted the Northwest Indiana region.

The award was renamed to honor John H. Davies who was recognized as the

Society's inaugural Lifetime Achievement Award recipient in 2019. As the founder and retired managing director of the Society of Innovators, he successfully led the organization from its inception in 2005 until 2018. Davies was also instrumental in relaunching the South Shore poster series in the late 1990s and worked with the South Shore Convention & Visitors Authority Northwest Indiana to create the Wall of Legends in 2004. A self-proclaimed champion for Northwest Indiana, Davies was one of the first to say that innovation exists in the region. He was

responsible for driving a culture of innovation here.

Department of Workforce Development issues fraud alert to unemployment insurance claimants

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development is issuing a fraud alert to notify those who have filed for unemployment insurance benefits in 2020 that they need to protect their personal information from potential scammers.

The U.S. Department of Labor Office of Inspector General has discovered that scammers are sending emails in an effort to steal claimants' passwords, account numbers, and/or Social Security numbers. With this information they can gain access to email, bank, or other accounts.

The scammers are sending

emails using the names of companies or individuals familiar to claimants. They use familiar icons, folder names, and programs to trick claimants into providing their personal information to them.

Claimants can protect themselves by hovering over the links scammers include in the emails, but not clicking on it, to see where it will take them. Most scammers will use a URL shortened to hide the website's true identity. You can also call the sender to inquire if the email is legitimate.

The links send the victim to a webpage, which looks like a Microsoft SharePoint website. It further requires the user to sign-in using a Google, Microsoft, Apple, Yahoo! or other user ac-

Once you have signed into a personal account, the scammers will obtain your username and password. They will have access to the files you have stored online and your contact lists. They may use this contact list to send the same scam email to your friends and family.

The scammers may use your personal information to collect unemployment insurance in your name or change your bank account number to one of their own.

Public access sites, canoe and kayak outfitters, lowhead dam locations and river miles are displayed in the map, which also includes USGS water gauges that display real-time stream flow

at stations across the state. The map compiles data layers that were collected over many years and managed by multiple divisions into one



Indiana State Medical Association connects Hoosier doctors with protective equipment

The Indiana State Medical Association has announced a new program to supply individual medical offices with the personal protective equipment needed to safely treat patients and protect their staff.

Shortages of PPE caused by the COVID-19 public health emergency have made re-opening difficult for many doctors. Now, physician practices of all sizes can purchase selected items at discounted rates that are comparable to bulk pricing. These items include hand sanitizer, isolation gowns and surgical masks.

"When the coronavirus first hit, many Hoosier doctors donated their own equipment for medical teams that needed it on the frontlines," said ISMA President Lisa Hatcher, MD. "I'm proud that the ISMA has joined with these Hoosier companies to give back to our physicians so they can get their patients and the state back on track. We are truly all in this together."

The shortage was severe enough that many doctor offices reduced hours or remained closed altogether. In survey responses collected by ISMA, physicians estimated needing on a monthly basis 700,000 patient masks; 600,000 respirator masks and 500,000 gowns, pairs of gloves and face shields to operate at full capacity.

ISMA staff turned to Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC), which identified several PPE suppliers and vetted them for quality and price.

"It has been truly incredible to see businesses all over the state step up to help in the fight against COVID-19 by providing PPE for our frontline workers," said Luke Bosso, IEDC chief of staff.


