A 2006 Crown Point High School graduate and Crown Point native is stationed with a command responsible for teaching future information warriors the skills required to defend America around the world.

Petty Officer 1st Class Brain Diederich works as a cryptologic technician (collection) and operates out of the Information Warfare Training Command (IWTC) Corry Station.

A cryptologic technician operates state-of-the-art computer systems to conduct information operations; collect, analyze and exploit signals of

interest to identify, locate and report worldwide threats. Diederich credits success in the Navy with lessons learned growing up in Crown

Point. "You have to keep pushing because eventually you will get there," said Diederich.

IWTC Corry Station is just one component that makes up the Center for Information Warfare Training (CIWT) domain, headquartered at Naval Air Station Pensacola Corry Station, Florida.

Charged with developing the future technical cadre of the information warfare community, the CIWT domain leads, manages, and delivers Navy and joint force training to 22,000 students annually.

# New report shows Indiana college graduation rates reaching all-time high

According the 2018 College Completion Report released by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education today, more Hoosier students are graduating college than ever. In addition, on-time college completion rates are improving across all four and two-year public campuses statewide, and extended graduation rates are increasing at most Indiana public campuses.

"It is encouraging to see Indiana's significant progress in moving the needle on college completion," said Indiana Commissioner of Higher Education Teresa Lubbers. "These successes are a direct reflection of the hard work happening at public campuses across the state, as well as the support of the General Assembly."

Nearly 40% of all Hoosier college students graduate on time; an increase of 13.9% over the past five years and 4% in one year.

Nearly 60% of all Hoosier college students complete college within an extended time frame; an increase of 2.8% in five years and 5% in one year. Nearly half of all Hoosier students who attend a public four-year campus graduate on time — an improvement of 10.9% over the past five

all Hoosier students who attended a public four-year campus graduate within the extended time frame.

Indiana's two-year campuses are seeing improvement in on-time graduation rates as well. Overall, 12.7% of students are graduating within four years - an improvement of 9% over the past five years. In addition, 32.2% of students at two-year campuses are graduating within six years.

The public campuses with the overall highest ontime completion are Indiana University Bloomington (on-time: 66.7%; extended: 83.8%), Purdue West years. Additionally, 68% of Lafayette (on-time: 58.9%;

extended: 84.2%), and Ball State University (on-time: 52.8%; extended: 73.9%).

Within the past year, campuses that experienced the most improvement in on-time graduation rates are Purdue University Northwest, Ball State University, Indiana University South Bend, Indiana University East, and University of Southern Indiana.

On-time graduation rates for 21st Century Scholars are improving at a greater rate than all other student populations. The improvement can be attributed in large part to the state financial aid reform enacted by Indiana lawmak-

ers in 2013, which required students to complete at least 30 credit hours each calendar year to stay on track for ontime graduation. Since then, the on-time graduation rate for Scholars has improved by 13.8%.

21st Century Scholars are more likely to graduate on time than their low-income peers. Throughout all Indiana public colleges, 30% of Scholars graduate on time compared to 24% of other low-income students.

21st Century Scholars are more likely to graduate on time at two-year campuses than the overall student population. While 12.7% of students at

two-year campuses graduate on time, Scholars have seen an on-time graduation rate of 17.3%- a 14.6% increase over the last five years.

"By every measure, 21st Century Scholars are improving and making measurable gains toward closing Indiana's college graduation achievement gap," said Commissioner Lubbers. "While the Scholar Success Program requirements have only been in place for a short time, I believe they are already making a significant difference and will continue to show that the Scholars program is an investment worth making for the state."

Conceived as "Three Days of Peace and Music," Woodstock was held on a 600-acre dairy farm in Bethel, New York.

Promoters had sold a total of 186,000 tickets and expected no more than 200,000 people to show up. By Friday night, however, thousands of eager early arrivals were pushing against the entrance gates. Fearing they could not control the crowds, the promoters made the decision to make it a free concert. Close to half a million people attended Woodstock, with another one million stuck on the roads, unable to get close enough to get in. Soaked by rain and wallowing in the muddy mess of fields, young hippies euphorically took in the performances of acts like Janis Joplin, Arlo Guthrie, Joe Cocker, Joan Baez, Creedence Clearwater Revival, The Grateful Dead, Jefferson Airplane, Sly and the Family Stone, and Crosby, Stills, Nash, & Young. The Who performed in the early morning hours of August 17, with Roger Daltrey belting out "See Me, Feel Me," from the now-classic album Tommy just as the sun began to rise. The most memorable moment of the concert for many fans was the closing performance by Jimi Hendrix, who gave a rambling, rocking solo guitar performance of "The Star Spangled Banner." www.history.com

#### Indiana Department of Revenue offers tips to aid newlyweds with possible tax changes Summertime has be-

Summertime has become an increasingly popular season for weddings, and the Indiana Department of Revenue wants to help Hoosier newlyweds as they embark on wedded bliss to avoid the headache of tax issues.

From name changes to filing status, DOR has several tips for 2018 newlyweds to be ready for next tax season and to ensure refunds are not delayed: 1.) Name changes: If a

customer changes their name as a result of marriage, the first step is to report this change to the Social Security Administration (SSA). Since tax returns are filed under an individual's Social Security number (SSN), it is important to complete the name change process before filing a tax return. The name on the tax return must match the SSN to ensure any potential refund goes to the correct person. More information can be found online at www.SSA. gov.

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# Purdue Northwest-Gabis Arboretum in Indiana's art and history experiences Valparaiso opens new music garden are available through Arts in the Parks

A new addition to the gardens at Gabis Arboretum boasts of colorful and musical instruments. The TreeSong Music Garden explores the combination of music and nature with unique outdoor instruments. The new garden invites visitors to use their imagination, be creative and explore. Each instrument has signage for self-guided musical program designed to connect music and nature as well as connect guests with appreciation and fundamentals of music.

# Remember to register off-road vehicles with the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles

Hoosiers who own offroad vehicles (ORVs) purchased after December 31, 2009, must register those ORVs through the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles. The registration law applies regardless of whether the ORV is driven on public or private land, although there are a few exceptions. More information about ORV registration requirements is at www.bmv.IN.gov/2468.htm.

ORVs include dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), utility task vehicles (UTVs), and side-by-sides.

A three-year ORV registration costs \$30.

Registration is required for all ORVs to enter Interlake and Redbird state recreation areas (SRAs), according to DNR's Carman Jackson, who manages both properties. Interlake and Redbird are former coal surface mines owned and managed by the DNR Division of Outdoor Recreation to provide publicland riding opportunities for ORV users.

For out-of-state visitors, the state also recognizes out-of-state ORV registrations. Out-of-state residents with unregistered ORVs can purchase an annual trail-use permit that will allow use at Redbird and Interlake SRAs only. These permits are available at the property gatehouses.

"We are seeing an increasing number of non-registered ORVs arriving at Interlake and Redbird," Jackson said. "Many Hoosiers are not aware of the registration requirement. Unfortunately, we have to deny them entrance to the property."

Registration allows police officers to track stolen ORVs and ORVs that have been used improperly. Furthermore, fees from ORV registration pay for increased off-roading opportunities,

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amenities and services.

Interlake and Redbird have added more trail miles for all vehicle types and rider skill levels. Recent improvements include shelters, picnic areas and observation decks that provide great views and family experiences.

"These funds are essential for property improvements," Jackson said.


