Northwest Indiana knits over 1,000 red hats to give hope for congenital heart defects

Each year approximately 40,000 babies are born in the United States with a congenital heart defect. Thousands of them will not reach their first birthday and thousands more die before they reach adulthood. There is reason for hope through continued research and awareness.

The tiniest patients at hospitals in Lake, Porter, and LaPorte County received hand-made red hats as part of the American Heart Association's 'Little Hats, Big Hearts' campaign.

With the support of local sponsor, Bosak Auto Group, the American Heart Association collected over

1,000 hats and distributed 100 hats to each participating hospital in Northwest Indiana.

Hats were collected at all five Bosak Auto Group locations in February. Additionally, Bosak fundraised through paper heart sales, and placed donation tins throughout their dealerships. Via a combination of corporate sponsorship and fundraising, Bosak Auto Group was able to present the American Heart Association with a check for over ten thousand dollars which will help to fund lifesaving research in the region.

nce 'Pantry on the Go' program will continue for 7th year Food Bank of MU ai

The Food Bank of Northwest Indiana and Northwest Indiana McDonald's Owners-Operators (NIMO) today announced that 'Pantry on the Go', the mobile food distribution program that serves more than 350,000 individuals in Northwest Indiana each year, will return for its seventh consecutive year in 2017. Pantry on the Go serves up to 250 meals each week to households across the Region between March and the end of the year.

The 2017 program began Wednesday at the Banta Center at 605 Beech Street in Valparaiso, and will continue

through the end of the year. Locations for Pantry on the Go are posted on the Food Bank's website each month and updates are regularly available on Facebook and Twitter. Unless otherwise noted, the Pantry on the Go visits each location from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

The weekly Pantry on the Go program travels throughout Northwest Indiana, stopping at churches, schools, organizations, and other destinations to distribute food assistance. Local Northwest Indiana McDonald's managers, supervisors, and crew members serve as volunteers at each location.

"Hunger exists in every community and affects more than 100,000 people across Northwest Indiana. Thanks to Pantry on the Go, many of these individuals and families have greater access to nutritious food," said Steve Beekman, executive director of the Food Bank of Northwest Indiana. "We are grateful not only for NIMO's support of this program, but for the many volunteers from local McDonald's restaurants who give their time to ensure this critical food assistance reaches those who need it most."

The partnership between NIMO and the Food Bank provides access to grains, fruits, vegetables, dairy and proteins for local families and individuals who are struggling with hunger and lack access to good, nutritious food. Those who feel they could benefit from the Pantry on the Go service need only to visit the assigned location with proof of Indiana residency (photo ID, utility bill, etc.) to receive food assistance.

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
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

Red Cross calls for type O negative and AB blood donors

The American Red Cross is issuing a call for type O negative and AB blood donors to make an appointment to give after severe winter weather in some parts of the country caused about 250 Red Cross blood drives to cancel in March, resulting in more than 8,500 uncollected blood donations.

Type O negative blood and type AB plasma are two of the most in-demand blood products by hospitals. Those who give can help patients locally or across the country as the Red Cross has the ability to move blood products where and when they are needed most

"All blood types are needed to meet the constant need of patients, and there is a significant need now for type O negative and AB donations to help some of the most vulnerable patients," said Plasma helps maintain blood Rodney Wilson, communications manager for Red Cross Blood Services. "We ask that you schedule an appointment to roll up a sleeve to help save a life in the coming days."

Type O negative blood can be transfused to patients with any blood type and is often needed in emergency situations when there isn't time to determine a patient's blood type. While less than 7% of the U.S. population has type O negative blood, hospitals depend on frequent O negative donations to ensure it's always available for patients in need. Type O negative blood donors are an important part of the Red Cross trauma team.

Type AB is the universal plasma type and can be transfused to patients of any blood type in an emergency.

pressure and supplies critical proteins for clotting and immunity. Plasma can be donated through a blood donation. Eligible donors can learn

more, find a donation opportunity and schedule an appointment by using the free Blood Donor App, visiting www.redcrossblood.org, or calling 800-733-2767. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18

years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

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IDHS partners with all 92 Indiana counties to provide all-hazard radios to residents

The Indiana Dunes Birding Festival, May 4 to 7, isn't just for serious birders.

Youth, family activities at Indiana

Dunes Birding Festival on May 6

Participants can expect a wide range of activities for young bird enthusiasts and families looking to explore birds in their backyards. For young birders and their families, the highlight is the Youth and Family Birding Day at Indiana Dunes State Park Nature Center on Saturday, May 6.

The day is sponsored by the Indiana Young Birders Club (IYBC). IYBC will offer beginning bird walks, bird ID quizzes with prizes and bird banding demonstrations. The Isaak Walton League will host a free bluebird box building workshop throughout the day. The Indiana Dunes Learning Center staff will have hands-on activities also. The International Crane Foundation will also be present with their mascot, 'Hope', a seven-foot tall Muppet crane created by the Jim Henson Company.

Audubon Society, the festival will highlight the dunes area's rich biodiversity and bird-watching opportunities.

Registration has already begun and runs through April. However, the Youth and Family Birding Day is free, regardless of registration to the rest of the festival activities, which include live bird of prey shows, morning birding tours, evening social events, and more. The Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS) is partnering with all 92 counties in the state to distribute more than 2,200 all-hazard weather radios to Organized by the Indiana Hoosiers. The radios will be distributed on the local level by each county's emergency management agency.

> "Receiving early warnings is critical to safety during severe weather events," said John Erickson, IDHS director of public affairs. "Allhazard radios, which provide a wide range of alerts, are a valuable tool that can help citizens make decisions to better protect themselves and their families."

The distribution focuses on citizens who are particularly vulnerable to the damaging effects of severe weather: economically disadvantaged citizens, residents of mobile and prefabricated homes, and others who may not be able to receive weather alerts by traditional means. Federal grants funded the purchase of the radios.

Mobile homes and other similar structures provide minimal protection against severe weather and other life-threatening disasters. In the event of severe weather,

IDHS advises mobile home residents to seek shelter in a building with a strong foundation.

All-hazard radios receive more than 60 emergency alerts including hazardous weather, local area warnings and information on current conditions from the National Weather Service. In the event of a power outage, backup batteries power the radio.


Most all-hazard radios

require a Specific Area Message Encoding (SAME) code number, which limits the emergency messages they receive to a specific geographic area. The list of Indiana counties and their corresponding SAME codes are available at www.nws. noaa.gov.

The Warsaw Pact - the military alliance between the Soviet Union and its eastern European satellites came to an end.

The Warsaw Pact was formed in 1955, primarily as a response to the decision by the United States and its western European allies to include a re-

armed West Germany in the North Atlantic Treaty Oraanization.

In 1954, NATO nations voted to allow a re-armed West Germany into the organization. The Soviets responded with the establishment of the Warsaw Pact.

The original members included the Soviet Union, East Germany, Poland, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, and Albania. Although the Soviets claimed that the organization was a defensive alliance, it soon became clear that the primary purpose of the pact was to reinforce communist dominance in Eastern Europe. In Hungary in 1956, and then again in Czechoslovakia in 1968, the Soviets invoked the pact to legitimize its interventions in squelching anticommunist revolutions.

By the late-1980s, however, anti-Soviet and anticommunist movements throughout Eastern Europe began to crack the Warsaw Pact. In 1990, East Germany left the Warsaw Pact in preparation for its re-unification with West Germany. Poland and Czechoslovakia also indicated their strong desire to withdraw. Faced with these protests - and suffering from a faltering economy and unstable political situation - the Soviet Union bowed to the inevitable. www.historv.com

All monies raised benefit the Prevent Child Abuse Lake County (PCALC). The chairs will be on display from March 25 to April 26 in the W.F. Wellman Exhibit Hall at the Indiana Welcome Center during normal business hours.

The decorated chair exhibit is presented by PCALC. This year's exhibit includes categories for middle school students, high school students, and adult organizations that work with children.

During the reception, a panel of local artists and teachers will judge the chairs and award the top three schools in both the middle and high school categories with a cash prize to assist with their art department. The adult category is not eligible for a cash prize.
