Indiana students continue graduating better prepared for college as AP exams increase again

In partnership with the Board and the College Indiana Commission for Higher Education, the Indiana Department Education recently nounced another year of increases in the number of Advanced Placement exams offered, taken, and passed.

"Preparing students for success beyond high school is a priority for Indiana's K-12 education system," said Dr. Jennifer McCormick,

Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction. "The continual increase in the number of schools offering AP exams, and the number of students passing exams shows once more Indiana is preparing students for the rigors of post-secondary experiences. We have the responsibility to aid in the preparation of students for their next four decades not just their next four years beyond high school. I congratulate and thank the

teachers, administrators, students, and partners whose work has made this possible."

AP is a research-based method to facilitate student participation and success through delivery of collegelevel courses and corresponding exams in the high school setting, to qualified high school students. Research suggests students who perform well in AP courses are predicted to not only outperform their peers, but have greater college success. For the 2017-2018 school year, Indiana reported the following increases:

• For the 2018 graduating class, 25,892 Indiana public school students took an AP exam, compared to 24,659 in the class of 2017.

• Since 2008, the percentage of Indiana public school graduates taking an AP exam during high school increased from 20% to 38.9%.

• In the past 10 years, the

number of Indiana public school students scoring 3 or better on at least one AP exam has increased from 6,284 to 13,403.

• In the past three years, the number of Indiana public school students scoring 3 or better on at least one AP exam has increased 12.6%.

"Our recent data show more Hoosier high school students are earning early college credit through AP and dual credit courses than ever before,"

said Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education Teresa Lubbers. "We are encouraged by this trend, as early college credit leads to higher success rates and cost savings for students and the state."

Flexibility and adaptability are key during Challenger games. Little League provides all chartered teams with a rulebook that includes a 'best practices' guide to operating a Challenger game. Typically, games are 1 to 2 innings long and last about an hour. All players play defensively and bat every inning.

Buddies are individuals who assist Challenger athletes in the areas of batting, base running, and defense, but only as needed. Often buddies are peer athletes who are participating in the Little League baseball or softball program.





Students can apply for FAFSA loans using new mobile app through April 15

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education announced that the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is open for the 2019-20 school year. With over \$300 million available in state financial aid-as well as billions of dollars in federal aid—it is more important than ever for Hoosiers to file the FAFSA on time by April 15, 2019.

This year, changes to the FAFSA will give students even more flexibility when filing for financial aid. The U.S. Department of Education recently revealed a new option for filing the FAFSA—a smartphone application. The myStudentAid app, available for iOS and Android devices, was designed to make it easier for the nearly 19 million students who file a FAFSA every year. Specifically, the app will benefit students who do not have a computer or high-speed internet at home.

It is important for all students to file the FAFSA regardless of family income. In addition to determining eligibility for state and federal financial aid, many colleges require a completed FAFSA to award merit and needbased scholarships. Filing the FAFSA is particularly important for Indiana's 21st Century Scholars who must file on time to earn the state scholarship that pays for up to four years of college tuition.

Students can file the FAFSA online at FAFSA. gov or using the myStudentAid app. The first step for students who have never filed the FAFSA is to create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID. Then, each student will

This day in history

March 22, 1972

The Equal Rights Amendment was passed by the U.S. Senate and sent to the states for ratification on this day in 1972. The ERA was to provide for the legal equality of the sexes and prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex.

First proposed in 1923, more than four decades passed before the revival of feminism in the late 1960s spurred its introduction into Congress. Under the leadership of U.S. Representative Bella Abzug and feminists Betty Friedan and Gloria Steinem, it won the requisite two-thirds vote from the U.S. House in October, 1971. In March, 1972, it was approved by the U.S. Senate and sent to the states.

Hawaii was the first state to ratify, followed by more than 30 others within a year. However, during the mid-1970s, a conservative backlash against feminism begun by Phyllis Schlafly, eroded support for the ERA, which ultimately failed to achieve ratification by the requisite 38, or three-fourths, of the states.

Because of the rejection of the Equal Rights Amendment, sexual equality, with the notable exception of when it pertains to the right to vote, is not protected by the U.S. Constitution. However, by the late 20th century, the federal government and all states passed considerable legislation protecting the legal rights of women.
