As summer winds down and school begins, Winfield's Town Marshal offers advice on driving and child safety

As we approach the end of summer, I want to take this time to offer some reminders about safety and the start of school.

The Crown Point School Corporation has scheduled children to return to classes on August 20 of this year. This includes Jerry Ross School here in Winfield, and Winfield Elementary School just south of town.

A new feature that you will see on Randolph Street is the flashing yellow lights indicating the school zone, in the morning and the afternoon. These lights were acquired through a safety grant from NIRPC and installed in July.

The speed limit when you see those lights flashing, indicating an active school zone, is 20 mph. The normal speed on that stretch of Randolph Street is 30 mph.

Be on the lookout for all school zone signals in the region and always obey the speed limits. School buses will be picking up and dropping off children again throughout Winfield.

A new law that went into effect in Indiana on July 1 created harsher penalties for drivers who pass a school bus when the 'stop arm' is out. This includes the suspension of their driving privileges. If a driver fails to stop for a school bus arm and causes an injury or death, they face felony charges.

This new law was drafted after a crash in Rochester, Indiana, killed three children and seriously injured a fourth one last year. Watch out for school crossing guards and for children waiting for school buses on sidewalks in residential neighborhoods. And be aware of increased traffic around schools and possible changes to traffic patterns during times where children are arriving or departing from school.

Lastly, I want to remind everyone the hazards of distracted driving. As you take that last summer vacation trip or weekend get-away, remember to wear your seatbelts and not to text and drive. Distracted driving is becom-(See Winfield Pg. 3)

LOFS family hosting charity golf outing to feed local students in need; registration underway

No one should go hungry, especially children. In Northwest Indiana, some local students rely on school lunches for their primary meals. On the weekend, they do not have enough food to stave off hunger. The term for this is 'food-insecure'. Often these same students qualify for free or reduced meals at the school. However, there are still students who do not qualify for free or reduced meals and still struggle with having enough food to eat on the weekends.

According to the US Census Bureau for 2017, #2 in the state for students receiving free and reduced lunch. Porter County ranked #11. According to www. FeedingIndianasHungry.org, one-in-seven Indiana residents is 'food insecure', both adults and children.

To help fight child hunger in Northwest Indiana, LOFS residents Mark and Gretchen Mercer started 'NWI No Child Hungry', a tax-exempt nonprofit geared to feeding local students in need on the weekends during the school year.

The program, Buddy Bags, offers single-serve, non-perishable sacked meals for Saturday and Sunday. Their Buddy Bag program

Gretchen Mercer, president, said, "The buddy bag program at FUMC is genuinely helping hundreds of students in Crown Point. We saw an obvious need here and ran with it. When I was a kid, I was food insecure. My parents budgeted a certain amount of money to feed us [4 kids] and when the food was gone, it was gone. We just had to figure it out."

In response to last week's shootings in Dayton, Ohio and El Paso, Texas, Vidor Friedman, MD, FACEP, president of the American College of Emergency Physician released the following statement:

"The American College of Emergency Physician joins the nation in mourning and offers our heartfelt condolences to the families, friends and communities forever impacted by the tragic shootings in Dayton, Ohio, and El Paso, Texas, this weekend."

"News reports are numbing, and even the most wellintentioned thoughts and prayers fall short. As emergency physicians, we are on the frontlines of treating the victims of these senseless, violent acts. The frequency of firearm injuries and fatalities in this country is staggering, and there is no doubt about the threat posed to America's public health and safety."

"Firearm injuries — accidental or otherwise should be addressed as a public health epidemic, with ic of gun violence through

investments in research and a sweeping commitment to change that matches or exceeds the level of a number of diseases, outbreaks or disorders that capture the public conscience but have exacted far less of a human toll in recent years."

In addition to their active participation in the American Foundation for Firearm Injury Reduction in Medicine — a non-profit organization founded and led by emergency physicians working to end the epidem-





horse chestnut tree she could see out of her window, and how it helped give her hope of surviving. In 2010 that tree collapsed due to disease. Before that happened, seed from the tree was collected. The stewards at the Anne Frank House in the Netherlands grew and distributed saplings from the seeds to numerous locations around the world.

The Anne Frank Center for Mutual Respect, which is in New York, received 11 of the saplings to donate to worthy educational organizations across the United States.

After a three-year safeguard quarantine, the saplings were cleared for planting in January 2013.

According to Hawkins, all other saplings from the original parent tree died, except for the three cared for by Indiana's Vallonia Nursery. Those three saplings were originally given to The Children's Museum in Indianapolis, which passed them on to the nursery, where they could receive better care.

In 2014, Hawkins, per request of the National Anne Frank Foundation, delivered and planted the first sapling on the Capitol grounds in

Washington D.C.

"It is growing well and has a plaque stating its historical importance," Hawkins said.

Plans are in the works for a site for the third tree.

Indiana prisoners training with IUPUI program to become peer health resources

Public health researchers at IUPUI are training some Indiana prisoners to become health resources and advocates for their peers as part of a worldwide program to improve health among underserved populations.

The Richard M. Fairbanks School of Public Health at IUPUI's ECHO Center is the first site to replicate Project ECHO's prison peer education program, launched in 2009 in New Mexico. Project ECHO, or Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes, is an innovative videoconferencing approach to sharing medical knowledge and training health care providers.

IUPUI's Indiana Peer Education Program ECHO team is training people who are incarcerated to become peer health educators. Graduates of the program can then pass on knowledge to their peers about common health conditions affecting prison populations, including infectious diseases such as hepatitis C, staph/MRSA skin infections and tuberculosis; mental health issues such as suicide risk, depression and anxiety; HIV and other sexually transmitted infections; diabetes; and ad-

These peer educators communicate strategies to reduce risky behaviors and serve as key resources for health information within the prisons, in addition to developing skills in self-efficacy, responsibility and leadership that can carry over into their lives after incarceration.

Andrea Janota, program coordinator at the ECHO Center, said the Indiana Peer Education Program's model is that "prison health is public health."

"Over 95% of people who are incarcerated will return to their home communities," Janota said. "The Indiana Peer Education Program ECHO is a train-the-trainer model that provides an extraordinary opportunity to improve not only the health of people who are incarcerated, but also the health of their families and communities."

Twenty men from the Industrial Correctional Facility in Pendleton and the Plainfield Correctional Facility completed the 40hour peer education training program in June and have begun hosting weekly health education workshops with their peers.

Janota said the peer health educators are talented and energetic facilitators who are able to use their lived experiences to reach their peers in ways that those who have never been incarcerated cannot. In addition to supporting health and safety in prisons, the program provides trainees with much more than health education.

"It provides the chance to be part of something, to be part of a community," she said. "While the program prepares peer educators with a strong understanding of health topics and preventative measures, it also helps them develop a professional skill set that is applicable anywhere in the workforce."

The Indiana Peer Education Program is a collaboration between the ECHO Center at IUPUI, Step-Up Inc., the Indiana Department of Corrections, and the Viral Hepatitis Program at the Indiana State Department of Health.

This day in history

August 16, 1977

Music icon Elvis Presley died in Memphis, Tennessee, at 42 on this day in 1977.

When Presley was 19, he paid \$4 to record a few songs as a present to his mother. Sam Philips, the owner of the studio, was intrigued by the rough, soulful quality of his voice and invited Presley back to practice with some local musicians. Afterwards, Philips agreed to release the rendition as a single on his Sun Records label. The recording went to the top of the local charts, and Presley's career was launched.

In 1955 Sun Records sold his contract to a major record label, RCA, for a record \$40,000. His first record for RCA was "Heartbreak Hotel," which made him a national sensation in early 1956. He followed this up with the double-sided hit record "Hound Dog" and "Don't Be Cruel." In September 1956, Elvis appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show, and teenagers went into hysterics over his dynamic stage presence, good looks, and simple but catchy songs.

In 1958, Presley was drafted into the U.S. Army and served an 18-month tour of duty in West Germany as a Jeep driver. All five singles released during this period, which were recorded before he left for the Army and meant to keep his name in the public's mind, eventually became millionsellers.
