Black bears may re-establish populations in Indiana after DNR confirms sighting

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources recently confirmed the presence of a black bear in and around Corydon in southern Indiana. The bear was first reported late last month. Indiana Conservation Officers received a call from a Harrison County homeowner of a bear going through the caller's garbage.

The sighting comes roughly a year after a black bear wandered into northwest Indiana from Michigan. That bear was the first verified presences of a bear in Indiana in more than 140 years. After spending several weeks in Indiana, the bear returned to Michigan.

Conservation officers, sheriff's deputies and local animal control officers responded but did not locate a bear.

But, the bear was observed by several people, including conservation officers, in areas near State Road 62 and



later in Corydon.

Young black bears are known to disperse in the springtime as they seek new territory in which to settle. The bear is most likely wild and swam across the Ohio River from Kentucky. Kentucky has an expanding bear population.

"We've anticipated this possibility and our staff has been preparing," said Linnea Petercheff staff operations specialist with the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife.

Black bears are shy by na-

ture and tend to avoid human contact. Attacks are rare. Black bears are non-aggressive in most instances and prefer fleeing from humans when given the chance. DNR wildlife biologists offer the following bear awareness tips for residents or for those who may be camping:

• Don't intentionally feed bears. If a bear becomes accustomed to finding food near your home, it may become a "problem" bear.

• Eliminate food attractants (See **Bears** Pg. 6)

Despite vehicle advances, records show AAA rescued 32 million drivers last year

Despite advances in vehicle technology, including maintenance reminders and other dashboard alerts designed to mitigate roadside trouble, AAA rescued a record-breaking 32 million drivers in 2015, with more battery, flat tire and key problems than ever before, a new ctudy shows

Vehicles fewer than five years old in particular experienced a higher proportion of tire and key-related issues than older vehicles, suggesting that the trend toward eliminating the spare tire and moving to electronic keyless ignitions may have unintended consequences.

"Vehicles today are a

vanced more than ever, yet are still vulnerable to breakdowns," said Cliff Ruud, AAA's managing director of Automotive Solutions. "Sleek, low profile tires are highly susceptible to damage, electronic keyless ignitions can zap battery life and despite advanced warning

Owners of new vehicles may be unaware that some new vehicle designs and features may leave them vulnerable at the roadside.

To reduce vehicle weight and boost fuel economy, spare tires are being elimi-

alarming rates, and are being replaced with tire inflator kits that can only remedy some flat tire situations.

Additionally, new keyless ignition systems can drain the battery life when keys are stored too close to the vehicle and can lock a driver out of the vehicle while the engine is still running.

Finally, despite nearly all new vehicles being equipped with low fuel warning alerts and range estimations, a higher proportion of drivers are using these systems to push the limits between fill-

After sunset, for a short



Restoration Coordinator John Henry Drake and Taltree Arborist Craig Gress.


Subject matters include prairies, trees, amphibians, wildlife, water, geology, birds, macroinvertebrates, people and natural resources.

To help prevent millions of roadside breakdowns from happening, AAA offers the following recommendations for common roadside problems:

Before purchasing a car, check that the vehicle includes a spare tire. If it doesn't, consider adding one as an option. Tire inflator kits -- which have replaced spare tires on tens of millions of vehicles -- cannot remedy all types of tire damage.

- Check tires: At least once a month, check the tire pressure to ensure proper inflation. This affects tire wear and vehicle handling. Tires should be rotated based on the manufacturer's recommended schedule for the vehicle.
- · Lockouts: AAA recommends motorists take special care of their "smart keys" and

keyless entry fobs. Always take keys when exiting the car, avoid exposing keylessentry remote or smart keys to water and always replace the key or fob battery when recommended by the vehicle manufacturer.

- Battery: AAA recommends that drivers have their vehicle's battery tested when it reaches three years of age and on an annual basis thereafter. AAA's Mobile Battery Service offers free battery testing for AAA members.
- Pack an emergency kit: A recent AAA survey shows that more than 40 percent of motorists do not carry an emergency kit in their vehicle. 





This day in history

August 19, 1909

The first race was held at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Built on 328 acres of farmland, the speedway was started by local businessmen as a testing facility for Indiana's growing automobile industry. The idea was that occasional races at the track would pit cars from different manufacturers against each other. After seeing what these cars could do, spectators would presumably head down to the showroom of their choice to get a closer look.

Twelve thousand spectators watched Austrian engineer Louis Schwitzer win the first race with an average speed of 57.4 miles per hour. The track's surface of crushed rock and tar proved a disaster, breaking up in a number of places and causing the deaths of two drivers, two mechanics and two spectators.

The surface was soon replaced with 3.2 million paving bricks, laid in a bed of sand and fixed with mortar. Dubbed "The Brickyard," the speedway reopened in December 1909. May 30, 1911, marked the debut of the Indy 500-a grueling 500-mile race that was an immediate hit with audiences

Since 1911, the Indianapolis 500 has been held every year, with the exception of 1917-18 and 1942-45, when the United States was involved in the two world wars. With an average crowd of 400,000, the Indy 500 is the best-attended event in U.S. sports.
