Record high 3.28 million Hoosiers were working in 2018

More Hoosiers were working than ever before, as Indiana ended 2018 by reporting record employment numbers for the year and job gains in every major sector measured by the state.

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development reported that the total number of employed Hoosiers in December preliminarily reached 3,284,190, while private employment hit 2,731,60 - both new highs for the state. Total preliminary private employment in 2018 grew by 42,700 people from the previous peak in December 2017, according

Dating back to July 2009, Indiana has gained 408,400 private jobs since state employment bottomed out during the Great Recession. That translates to private sector job growth of 17.6% -- better than the Midwest region, which registered 13.4% employment growth during that period. Also, Indiana's labor force participation rate in December stood at 65.1%. The rate has now outperformed the national average (63.1%) for 55 consecutive months.

This day in history

February 15, 1970

The trial for eight antiwar activists charged with

inciting the violent demonstrations at the August,

1968, Democratic National Convention took

place in Chicago. On this day in 1970, defense

attorneys William Kunstler and Leonard Weinglass


and three of the defendants were sentenced to

The trial, presided over by Judge Julius Hoffman, turned into a circus as the defendants and their attorneys used the court as a platform to attack President Nixon, the Vietnam War, racism, and oppression. Their tactics were so disruptive that Judge Hoffman ordered Seale gagged and bound to his chair.

As the trial ended, Judge Hoffman found all the defendants and their attorneys guilty of 175 counts of contempt of court and sentenced them to prison terms. Although declaring the defendants not guilty of conspiracy, the jury found all but Froines and Weiner guilty of intent to riot.

None served time because a 1972 Court of Appeals decision overturned the criminal convictions; eventually, most of the contempt charges were also dropped.







Ball State University study shows regular lifelong exercise keeps the body decades younger

Exercising on a regular basis over a lifetime may help keep the body decades younger, says new research from Ball State University.

Cardiovascular and Skeletal Muscle Health with Lifelong Exercise, an analysis of septuagenarians who have been exercising for decades, found that they have heart and lung capacities and muscle fitness like healthy people in their early 40's.

The study provided a unique opportunity to assess the physiological benefit of lifelong exercise by comparing exercisers in their 70s with their younger counterparts and sedentary people their own age. The study was published in August in the Journal of Applied Physiology.

take-home message," said Scott Trappe, director of Ball State's Human Performance Laboratory and leader of the 11-person research team. "We saw that people who exercise regularly year after year have better overall health. These 75-year-olds — men and women — have similar cardiovascular health to a 40- to 45-year-old."

With the average study participant, characterized as a lifelong exerciser, working out is a hobby. On average, each exercised about five days a week for about seven hours in total.

The cardiovascular health was gauged by having participants cycle on an indoor bike to determine VO2 max, which measures the maximum amount of oxygen a person can use during intense

exercise and establishes aerobic endurance. Each participant also had a muscle biopsy to determine how capillaries formed and aerobic enzyme activity.

VO2max typically declines by about 10% per decade after age 30. The age-related reduction in VO2 max is directly associated with an increasing risk of multiple chronic diseases, mortality and loss of independence.

Researchers also broke the male subjects into two groups: the performance group and the fitness group. The performance group's training revolved around competition. The fitness group's revolved around simply exercising.

"For some of the variables, the performance group had

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some metrics that were superior to the fitness people, and cardiovascular capacity was one of those," Trappe said. "But things like muscle health and capillaries to support blood flow, they were equivalent between the two groups. Higher intensity didn't necessarily take them to a higher place."

HPL researchers have been studying athletes since its creation in the 1960s. For this latest project, Ball State researchers recruited people who have been regularly training for decades by running, biking, swimming or whatever exercise they enjoyed.

"When we started this project, I didn't know if we'd find enough of these lifelong exercisers, and once we got into it, I was signing up for local races and introducing myself," he said. "But then what would happen is they would recruit - they'd bring in their training buddies. We had a husband and wife team who rode a tandem bicycle together. They've ridden 4,000 to 5,000 miles together outdoors since the mid-1980s. There's tons of people like this out there."

Trappe acknowledged that while younger adults can handle more intense exercise, many septuagenarians have managed to find new ways to stay in shape at a fairly high level.

Trappe said the benefits of

the study should be obvious for the average person: 30 to 60 minutes of exercise a day may be the key to a healthy life.

"If you want to put 30 to 45 minutes of walking in one day, the amount of health benefit you are going to get from that is going to be significant and substantial," he said. "Will it equal the person training for competitive performances? No. But, it will outdo the couch potato. In basic terms, 30 to 45 minutes of any type of exercise a day is beneficial."
