54 million+ Americans to travel this Thanksgiving; most since 2005

The AAA projects 54.3 million Americans will journey 50 miles or more away from home this Thanksgiving, a 4.8 percent increase over last year. The 2018 holiday weekend will see the highest Thanksgiving travel volume in more than a dozen years (since 2005), with 2.5 million more people taking to the nation's roads, skies, rails and waterways than last year. "Thanksgiving is one of the busiest holidays for road trips, and this year will be no different," says Trevor Reed, transportation analyst at INRIX. "Knowing when and where congestion will build stress of sitting in traffic. Our advice to drivers is to avoid commuting times in major cities altogether or plan alternative routes."

In most cases, the best days to travel will be on Thanksgiving Day, Friday or Saturday. Drivers should expect increased travel times on Sunday as most holiday travelers will be making their way home after the long weekend.



November 30 deadline quickly approaching for scholarship applications to assist aspiring educators

Current high school seniors planning to pursue a degree in education can now apply for the Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship, according to State Rep. Julie Olthoff (R-Crown Point).

The scholarship provides \$7,500 a year for a maximum of four years to 200 students who attend an Indiana college or university.

Olthoff said the scholarship was established to encourage

more high-achieving students to pursue a career in Indiana classrooms. Applicants must be in the top 20% of their high school graduating class or have earned a score in the top 20th percentile on the SAT or ACT. Recipients must commit to teaching in Indiana for five consecutive years upon graduation.

Interested students should be nominated by a teacher and submit a nomination form with their application, which is available at www.ScholarTrack.IN.gov. College students currently studying education may also apply as long as they graduated from an Indiana accredited high school or non-accredited nonpublic high school.

The Lake County Master Gardeners have announced that they will be continuing their scholarship program for the 2019-20 academic year.

Although the LCMGA has been awarding scholarships for the past thirteen years, this will be the first year that scholarship applications will be available through the Crown Point Community Foundation website, and the first year incoming freshmen attending a four-year institution are eligible to apply.

Scholarships will be awarded to undergraduate college and university students, who are residents of Lake County, Indiana. In addition to the majors of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture, majors of Forestry, Botany (Horticulture Equivalent), Plant Pathology, Agricultural

Education, and Entomology are eligible as well. Other majors that benefit consumer gardening may be considered.

Health Resources and Services Administration awards \$10,911,705 to Indiana Department of Health

The Health Resources and Services Administration recently announced \$10,911,705 to Indiana, specifically, the Indiana State Department of Health through the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program. These funds support communities to provide voluntary, evidence-based home visiting services to women during pregnancy, and to parents with young children up to kindergarten entry. Nationally, \$361 million in funding was awarded to 56 states, territories, and non-profit organizations.

"Evidence-based home visiting programs help parents improve their family's health and provide better opportunities for their children," said HRSA Administrator George Sigounas, MS, Ph.D. "These awards allow states to support local agencies in providing tailored home visiting services, meeting the specific needs of families in their own communities."

The award is an increase to the \$10,434,596 issued in FY 2017 to Indiana to reach parents and children most in need. Over the past six years, nationally, the MIECHV Program has provided over 4.2 million home visits. In FY 2017, the MIECHV Program served more than 156,000 parents and children in all 50 states. the District of Columbia, and five territories, and provided over 942,000 home visits. The Program serves almost 42% of U.S. counties with high rates of poor birth outcomes or poverty. Almost three-fourths of families participating in the program had household incomes at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level.

Administered by HRSA, in close partnership with the Administration for Children and Families, the MIECHV Program supports pregnant women and families, particularly those considered at-risk,

as they raise children who are physically, socially, and emo-

The transition will begin immediately. A formal launch is planned for IYI's Kids Count Conference on November 27 and 28.

With support from the Indiana Education Savings Authority Lilly Endowment, Promise Indiana began its operations in 2013, as part of the Wabash County YMCA, which has served as the home and backbone organization for the Wabash County Promise. Twenty-four additional communities have launched local initiatives in the five years since the Wabash County effort began.

Indiana University and Uffizi Gallery unveil website featuring first set of 3D, digitized artifacts

As a result of a collaboration between Indiana University and the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, Italy, it's now possible to view some of the world's most admired ancient artifacts and sculptures in 3D without traveling

A newly launched website, www.digitalsculptureuffizi.org, was recently unveiled in a ceremony at the historic Uffizi Gallery. The site currently contains over 300 digitized sculptures and fragments from the collec-

The project was announced in 2016 at the Uffizi Gallery in a joint presentation by IU President Michael A. McRobbie and Uffizi Gallery Director Eike Schmidt.

"As we accomplish the goals set forth in this unprecedented and enormously ambitious project, the unveiling of this new website marks a first major milestone in a collaboration that will generate unparalleled opportunity for scholarly engagement with materials housed in one of the world's oldest and very finest galleries," McRobbie said. "By leveraging IU's scholarly expertise in ancient art and culture, as well as our extensive technological capabilities, this collection of magnificent, inspiring and irreplaceable classical antiquities can now be viewed and studied in an entirely new and fascinating way by scholars, museum professionals, students and the general public."

The team is led by Bernard Frischer, IU professor of informatics, director of the university's Virtual World Heritage Laboratory and one of the world's leading virtual archaeologists. A key partner on the project has been the Politecnico di Milano, under the direction of professor Gabriele Guidi.

"I am very pleased by the progress of our work on this five-year project both in terms of quantity and quality," Frischer said. "We're about halfway through the project and are on target to finish the job, as foreseen, in

"We have already digitized more works of classical sculpture than has ever been done in a single museum. Even more impressive than the quantity of my students' work is its quality. I have shown the models they have made to many museum professionals in the United States and abroad. They have

been uniformly impressed, and this has led to invitations to undertake new projects of digitization at the Getty Villa in Malibu, Palazzo Altemps in Rome and the National Archaeological Museum of Naples."

The Uffizi Gallery, adjacent to the Piazza della Signoria in central Florence, houses some of the world's finest masterpieces, including works by Botticelli, Caravaggio, da Vinci, Fra Angelico, Michelangelo, Raphael, and Titian. It is among the most visited museums in Italy, with more than 1.5 million visitors each





Indiana and Manitoba form partnership to advance agriculture, economic development

Two northern Indiana nature preserves honored as 'Wetlands of Distinction'

Chamberlain Lake and Spicer Lake, two nature preserves in St. Joseph County, have been named 'Wetlands of Distinction" by the Society of Wetlands Scientists.

Status as a 'wetland of distinction' means the wetland is one of the country's most ecologically sensitive landscapes, and exhibits exemplary function and service.

Chamberlain Lake Nature Preserve covers 82.5 acres. Its namesake lake is covered with a mat of vegetation composed of rare sedges and other species. It is owned and managed by the DNR Division of Nature Preserves. A trail leads through its woods to the lake. Its parking lot and trail are maintained by the DNR, with the assistance of the St. Joseph County Parks and Recreation Department.

Spicer Lake Nature Preserve comprises 196 acres. It is owned and managed by the St. Joseph County Parks and Recreation Department. Its namesake lake is a kettle lake within the park. It is a dedicated state nature preserve. A quarter-mile boardwalk, two additional viewing platforms and roughly 7 miles of trails exist within the property, making the wetland accessible to hikers, wildlife watchers and nature photog-

This day in history

November 16, 1957

Notre Dame beat Oklahoma 7-0, ending the Sooners' 47-game, 1,512-day college football winning streak. The game also marked the first time in more than 120 games that Oklahoma didn't score a single point. Sooners fans were stunned. Some cried; some sat in the stadium for more than an hour after the game was over

At the beginning of the 1953 season, the Fighting Irish had beaten Oklahoma 28-21. The next week, the Sooners had tied Pitt 7-7. The week after that, they'd beaten Texas 19-14, and they hadn't lost since. For their part, the Irish were coming off of a humiliating 1956 season; their worst ever-in which they'd lost to the Sooners 40-

Oklahoma was the 18-point favorite, but, as their halfback pointed out years later, "was Notre Dame excited? Hell yeah. They're playing the No. 1 team that had a 47-game winning streak. They played a little better against us than I think they did most people. They were pretty damn tough."

At the beginning of the game, it looked like it was going to be another Oklahoma rout: Wilkinson's team had possession three times near the end zone but couldn't manage to score. Then, early in the next quarter, Notre Dame fullback Nick Pietrosante sacked the Sooners' quarterback, grabbed the fumble and ran the ball 19 yards.
